

iPad2 Navigation in iOS 5:





- 4-finger swipe up (or double-click the Home button) reveals the multitasking bar (also known as the "app switcher")
- 4-finger swipe left or right switches between open apps (useful, for example, when reading the PDF version of a textbook and then switching quickly to a word processor to write responses)
- 2-finger expand/pinch increases/decreases the magnification in certain apps (without needing to use "Zoom")

Low vision features on the iPad:

- "Zoom"
 - o activate in "Settings General Accessibility" or set as default "Triple-click Home"
 - o activate with a 3-finger double tap then release on the screen
 - adjust zoom level with a 3-finger double tap and hold on the screen, followed by sliding 3-fingers up or down (to enlarge or reduce respectively)
 - o navigate with a 3-finger single tap and hold, then move around the screen
 - this feature works well in the Home Screen as the fonts there cannot be enlarged otherwise
- "Large Text"
 - o maximum size is 56 point
 - o only works on some built-in apps (such as Notes, Calendar, etc.)
- "White on Black" not actually black and white contract, but rather a reversal of all colours)
 - o activate in "Settings General Accessibility" or set as default "Triple-click Home"
- "Speak Selection" whatever is highlighted in most apps can be read aloud (e.g. Safari)
 - o activate in "Settings General Accessibility"
- To reduce/eliminate glare from the high-gloss screen, consider applying a matte screen protector (there are many after-market manufacturers such as *I-con*, available at *BestBuy*, *etc.*)





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iPad Navigation with VoiceOver (http://www.apple.com/accessibility/ipad/vision.html):

- activate in "Settings General Accessibility" or set as default "Triple-click Home"
- without needing to be touch above each one, the user can move systematically from one "container" (an option within an app) to the next, or move from one app or app folder to the next on the Home Screen; this is done by flicking to the right with a single finger (a flick left will go to the previous), then double-tap to open/activate
- to turn off apps, open the multitasking bar / "app switcher" (by using a 4-finger flick up, or double-click the Home button), then double-tap-and-hold on the app to initiate the "editing apps... remove from app switcher" option...
- 1-finger tap reads the item under the finger
- 1-finger flick right or left select the next or previous item
- 1-finger flick up or down changes the Rotor setting (e.g. text-to-speech language, typing mode)
- 2-finger flick up reads from top of page
- 2-finger flick down reads from current position
- 2-finger tap pauses reading
- 2-finger tap restarts the reading
- 2-finger double-tap plays or pauses currently music or video selection
- 3-finger flick up or down to scroll up or down on a page
- 3-finger flick right or left to scroll page-by-page next or previous
- 3-finger double-tap will mute/unmute VoiceOver
- 3-finger triple-tap turns on/off the visual display (apparently does not conserve power?)

Keyboard typing:

On-screen keyboard:

- with VoiceOver enabled, "standard" typing requires a double-tap on each letter; however, "touch" typing can be enabled where one only needs to let go of the desired letter to have it typed (much faster typing mode)
- to change typing mode when using VoiceOver, a setting called "Rotor" can be changed to switch between typing mode
 - when typing in a text field, use 2 fingers to make a rotating motion (for example, using one's thumb and forefinger, open a bottle top or twist an imaginary dial), and rotate until "Typing Mode" is announced
 - o perform a flick up or down to switch back and forth between "standard" and "touch" typing

External keyboards:

- various BlueTooth keyboards are compatible with the iPad (Apple brand or other manufacturers),
 and connect wirelessly (but use more battery power)
- the "Apple Keyboard Dock" (no longer available) connects via the 30 pin port (at the bottom edge of the iPad), but only allows for portrait orientation of the screen
- some USB keyboards can connect to the iPad using the USB adapter from the "Apple Camera Connection Kit" (ZoomText keyboard, for example)

 - Create unique QR codes that you can print and attach to household objects just scan and the iPad/iPhone will inform the user what object they've scanned (e.g. differentiate between various boxes in the cupboard)
- VizWiz (free) blind users take a picture with their iPhone/iPad, ask a question, and via WiFi sends and receives a response from a remote sighted assistant

- Listen At It app (free)
 - this iPhone app will take a photo using your device's rear camera, then by moving one's fingers around, sounds represent color and brightness of the picture... apparently by rubbing one's finger back and forth, one may be able to identify the object in the pic

 - it alters the spectrum displayed on the screen so persons with red-green colour deficits can identify colours

- FaceTime (built-in) connect to others via audio and/or video to another iDevice with FaceTime
- Skype connect to others via audio and/or video to anyone running Skype on their iDevice or computer desktop/laptop (PC or Mac)

 - o can only connect 1-to-1; does not work for conferencing via Skype business version

Navigation:

- compasses for iPad
 - o iPad2 has the built-in compass technology but no app (unlike iPhone which has an app)
 - there are many compass apps (some free, some not)
 - o some may work with VoiceOver
 - o some have better contrast for low vision (e.g. http://itunes.apple.com/us/app/compass-for-ipad-free/id378640003?mt=8)
- Sendaro GPS LookAround (\$4.99) accessible GPS app for iPhone

- Navigon Canada GPS that works with the built-in accessibility on the iPad/iPhone

Word processing:

- Notes (built-in)
 - limited font selection
 - o files can be emailed (if the iPad is configured for email and has wireless access) or printed to a wi-fi printer
- PlainText (free)

 - o similar to Notes, but can organize files into folders and send via DropBox (see below)
- Pages (\$9.99)
 - http://itunes.apple.com/ca/app/pages/id361309726?mt=8
 - limited filing system (1 layer of folders)
 - o for taking notes, importing Word documents, emailing assignments, saving to iCloud
 - Note: according to Jessica, iCloud seems a bit cumbersome to transfer documents; she prefers DropBox (http://itunes.apple.com/ca/app/dropbox/id327630330?mt=8)
- EverNote (free)

 - o filing system (multiple layers of folders and subfolders)
 - o files saved to iCloud
- Quickoffice® Pro HD (\$14.99)

PDF documents viewers:

- iBooks (free) can open PDF files in addition to various book types
 - o does not allow text to be selected (and therefore Speak Selection does not work)
 - o 2-finger pinch/expand works best for low vision
 - o Zoom works, as does VoiceOver (if PDF has rendered text and not just an image of text)

- kobo (free) can open PDF files in addition to various book types
 - does not allow text to be selected (and therefore Speak Selection does not work)
 - o 2-finger pinch/expand works best for low vision
 - Zoom works, but VoiceOver does not

- GoodReader for iPad PDF reader (Low Vision friendly; doesn't work with VoiceOver) \$4.99
 - read PDFs, personalize magnification settings and contrast; option to switch to text-only mode when auto-wrap limits navigation
 - o untested for accessibility

- pdf-notes for iPad (free; upgrade to non-advertising version for \$9.99)
 - o allows user to add notes overtop the PDF document
 - works well with DropBox
 - o 2-finger pinch/expand works best for low vision
 - does not allow text to be selected (and therefore Speak Selection does not work)
 - o some features conflict with Zoom feature's 3-finger commands; not VoiceOver friendly

- Adobe Reader
 - o does not allow text to be selected (and therefore Speak Selection does not work)
 - o 2-finger pinch/expand works best for low vision, and works with Zoom feature
 - o menus are VoiceOver friendly; reading the actual document is not VoiceOver friendly
